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Larry Biles Retires after 11 years as Kansas State Forester

Biles has served in many roles throughout his career, including two years with the U.S. Army, eight years as a district forester for Kansas State University; seven years as the urban forestry coordinator for the U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service in Atlanta; five years as a real estate property manager in Lawrenceville, Georgia; 13 years as forestry program leader for USDA Extension Service in Washington, D.C.; and five years as director for the Southern Forestry Research Partnership in Athens, Georgia. Biles was named state forester for the Kansas Forest Service in July 2008.

Biles received his bachelor's degree in forestry from the University of Missouri and a master's degree in ornamental horticulture from Kansas State University.

According to employees at the Kansas Forest Service, it is difficult, if not impossible, to sum up his achievements over the duration of his dedicated service. "Larry has been an integral part of our agency and his contributions will always be valued and remembered," said Aimee Hawkes, budget/fiscal coordinator and office manager. 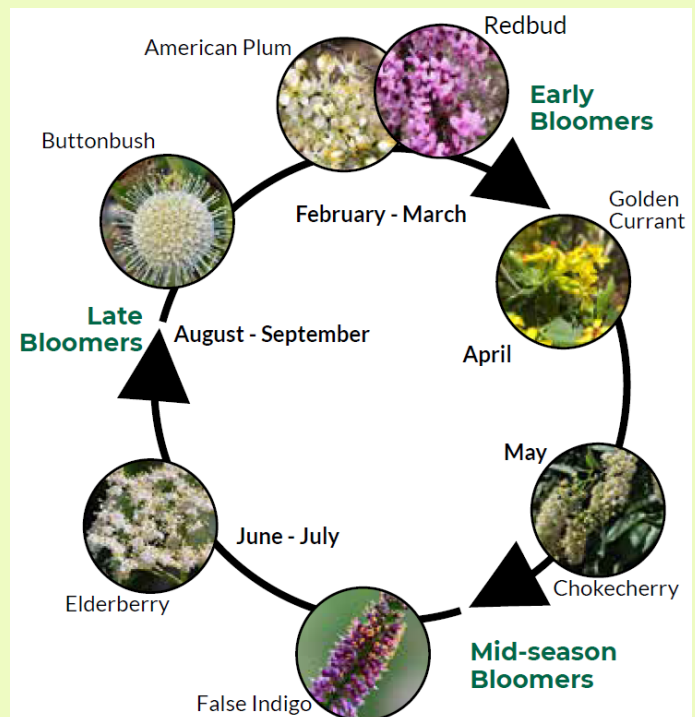

Ragnar Original Innovation Carbonator 500 Demonstration for Biochar Production

There was a demonstration of the ROI Carbonator 500 held near Haven on November 20. This was a free come-and-go event to provide an opportunity to see how woody debris from Kansas can be converted into biochar. "Finding cost effective and practical means for utilizing high volumes of wood waste derived from storm damage, windbreak renovation, timber stand improvement practices, community forest management, and primary and secondary wood manufacturing processes is a challenge," said Dave Bruton, marketing and utilization forester with the Kansas Forest Service.



The Carbonator 500 is a mobile biochar production system that converts trees, brush, stumps and other wood debris into a high-quality biochar. At nearly forty feet long, the immense Carbonator 500 is capable of burning 15-20 tons of wood waste per hour, with five to ten percent of the material converted into biochar.

Unlike burning waste wood in piles for disposal, biochar production uses a process called pyrolysis which captures carbon in the wood instead of releasing it into the atmosphere.

Beyond the sequestration of carbon, biochar can be used to amend soil, filter water, odor control in animal bedding and waste systems, erosion control and much more.

"We are constantly on the lookout for ways to improve efficiencies and utilize 'waste' materials and this equipment is one more tool available to consider," said Bruton. For any questions or more information, contact Dave Bruton at 785.313.2295 or dburton@ksu.edu.
